WHAT WE DO



• INNOVATION

We take a fresh approach to development using sport where it hasn't been applied before. One of our innovations in 2012 in partnership with Enable Development was the introduction of Wheelout, a wheelchair basketball fundraising event with proceeds supporting our international programs. The inaugural Wheelout@ANU event took place in Canberra on 3 August 2012 and raised funds for Wheelout Solomon Islands.

• MEASUREMENT

We develop effective monitoring and evaluation strategies, clear program goals and objectives and logical processes to measure impact in development terms. Sport Matters designed a monitoring and evaluation framework for ChildFund Laos to measure the impact of its new sport and play initiative that promotes voice, power and agency in children and youth. The strategy supported ChildFund Laos' existing measurement frameworks and incorporated participatory approaches such as Village Record Books, monthly interviews and Most Significant Change stories.

• PARTNERSHIPS

We create new partnerships and ongoing relationships between the aid and development sector, the sport sector and community organisations. Our partnership approach in Laos brought together ChildFund Laos and the Lao Rugby Federation to introduce a sustainable sport for development program targeting children and youth across twelve villages in Laos.

• ADVOCACY

We raise the profile in Australia and internationally of the power of sport to achieve development outcomes and advocate for human rights.



• **CAPACITY-BUILDING**

We design strategies that enhance the abilities of individuals and organisations to build social capital as well as develop knowledge, skills and attitudes. We enable local community sport for development programs to create sustainable solutions to meet their development needs.

SOUTH AFRICA

In October 2011 Sport Matters delivered two train-the-trainer basketball workshops in Elandsdoorn (Limpopo) and Mitchell’s Plain (Cape Town) South Africa in partnership with RESPO International using basketball to promote the rights of people with disabilities.

FIJI

In November and December 2011, Sport Matters delivered a sport for development workshop in Fiji for representatives of national and regional Disabled People’s Organisations (DPOs) in partnership with the Australian Sports Commission and their Australian Sports Outreach Project in Fiji.

LAOS

In July and August 2012, Sport Matters delivered a comprehensive sport for development project in partnership with ChildFund Laos and Lao Rugby Federation, to support ChildFund Laos’ Child and Youth Participation for Development project. Sport Matters trained 52 Youth Leaders who are expected to have an impact on over 5,500 children and youth in twelve target villages in the Nonghet district in Laos.

• **TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE**

We support and advise organisations in strategy development for new and existing programs and deliver professional development workshops for staff. In November and December 2011, Sport Matters provided technical assistance to the Australian Sports Commission for the re-design of the Australian Sports Outreach Program (ASOP) in Fiji. Consultations included surveys, focus groups and interviews with a range of stakeholders including; national sport federations, Disabled People’s Organisations (DPOs), government and community partners.

Sport Matters also participated in three theory of change consultations with the Australian Agency for International Development (AusAID) conducted in Melbourne and Fiji, with a focus on disability inclusive development through sport in the Pacific.

• GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE

Sport Matters is a Company Limited by Guarantee registered in NSW (ACN: 153 389 676) and a recognised Charitable Institution with the Australian Taxation Office.

Our voluntary board provides strategic advice and direction for the organisation and brings a wealth of experience in the corporate and not-for-profit sectors across sport, international development, finance, marketing, sponsorship and fundraising. There were six Directors at the end of the financial year with three founding Directors and three Directors appointed on 3 April 2012.

• THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Atma Maharaj is currently CEO of Latitude 12 Pty Ltd. His previous appointments include Chief Executive Officer at Fiji Investment Corporation Limited and General Manager of Toyota Tsusho (South Seas) Ltd. Atma has served as a Board Member and Director of a range of Commercial, Public and Civic institutions. He has outstanding experience in Sports Leadership at National, Regional and International levels, including being Secretary-General and Vice President of the National Olympic Committee of Fiji, and various Team Fiji leadership roles to

8 Olympic Games. Atma is a Chartered Accountant, a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Management, a Member of the Australian Institute of Company Directors and a Senior Member of the Australian Computer Society. Originally from Fiji, Atma is now based in Darwin

Belinda Barnier grew up in Sydney and moved to Canberra to start a family in Canberra in 1987. In 1988, she established her own advertising business which grew to include business development, sponsorship and event man-

agement. In 1995, Belinda created the "Corporate Club" a corporate entertaining and development program for the Canberra Theatre Centre. This strategic program grew sponsorship for the Arts in the nation's capital and provided reliable funding and corporate partnerships until 2002. Belinda holds the position of Senior Executive responsible for Workplace Giving & Matched Gifts for Australian Red Cross. Prior to this role she was responsible for Marketing, Fundraising and Communications for Red Cross in the ACT and region. In her capacity as a volunteer, Belinda Chairs the Fundraising Committee for Technical Aids for Disabled ACT (TADACTION) and supports humanitarian work in Timor-Leste and Vanuatu. Belinda's passions in life are a healthy and engaged community, the arts and travel.

Michael Pilbrow has been working in international development for 20 years. For over 10 years, he worked for the Australian Government's official aid agency, AusAID, in key policy, multi-lateral and Southeast Asian program roles. He was the senior Australian aid representative in Thailand, and also worked in the office of the Australian Minister for Development Cooperation and Pacific Island Affairs. Since 2003, he has been a consultant providing advice and leading projects for clients in Australia and overseas, focused on strategic planning, project development and relationship-building. Michael has a Bachelor of Economics (Honours) from Monash University. He is currently the Chairman of the West Belconnen Health Cooperative, Founder and past Coordinator of the Charnwood Community Carnival and has had long involvement with junior sport as a coach, manager, umpire and committee member (across AFL, soccer, cricket and athletics).

Michael is a Member of the Australian Institute of Company Directors and the Council of Small Business of Australia, and an ACT Finalist for the Australian of the Year Local Hero Award in 2012. Michael lives near Canberra and has offices in Canberra and Yass.

Adrian Lauff has worked in corporate finance for over 10 years in Australia and the United Kingdom, and also ran a successful wholesale/distribution business for 5 years. He brings a wealth of experience in the areas of corporate finance, financial accounting, strategic planning, supply chain and operations from a variety of roles in companies such as; Corporate Express, Aristocrat Leisure, Electronic Arts and Glaxo SmithKline. He is a Certified Practising Accountant in Australia and is currently Commercial Manager in one of Australia's top 10 listed companies. Adrian is an avid sportsman with a passion for football and motor-racing. At the club level Adrian has been involved in football as a player, coach, referee and administrator. He is a firm believer in the universal language of sport and that all people, from as young as possible, should have both the opportunity and access to participate in sport across multiple sporting codes. Liesl Tesch is a Paralympian, a high school teacher and is passionate about the benefits of creating sporting opportunities for people with disabilities. Liesl played professional wheelchair basketball in Spain, Italy and France, and continues to support the development of women's wheelchair basketball in Australia and around the world. Liesl has coached wheelchair basketball and worked to develop sport for people with disabilities in a number of international communities. Liesl has Bachelor of Science, with a major interest in Human Development Geography, a Diploma in Education and works as a motivational speaker. Liesl recently retired from the Australian Women's Wheelchair Basketball Team, the Gliders (with two Silver and one Bronze Medal) and won a Gold Medal in Paralympic Sailing at the London 2012 Paralympic Games. Liesl lives and works on the Central Coast of NSW.

Jackie Lauff is a sport and development practitioner who has worked in various roles within local, national and international sport organisations in Australia, Fiji, Germany and China. Jackie has an undergraduate degree in Occupational Therapy, a Master of International and Community Development from Deakin University and a Master of Adapted Physical Activity with the Norwegian School of Sport Sciences. She has coordinated international seminars on Sport in Post-Disaster Intervention and Sport Leadership, and also lectured at the Australian College of Physical Education in Inclusive Coaching. Jackie is a member of the Executive Committee of the Australian Disability and Development Consortium, the Rotary E-Club of Greater Sydney and a reviewer for the International Journal of Sport and Development. Currently, Jackie is CEO of Sport Matters and is based in Sydney.
